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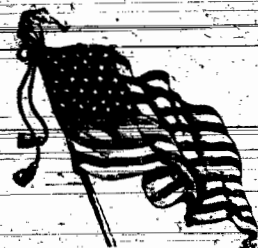

**SOUTHERN RAILWAY By PRESIDENT FAIRFAX HARRISON**

Washington, D. C., April 18.—Our participation in the war against Germany makes it more than ever important that every Southern farmer shall produce the foods and feedstuffs needed for the people and animals of his farm and a surplus for sale," said President Fairfax Harrison of the Southern Railway System, today.

Vast quantities of foods and forages will be required for our own army and navy and for our allies in Europe. These requirements for carrying on the war must be met, even though our people at home have to be put on short rations. There is every reason to believe that prices of foods and feedstuffs will be high, and while it is the patriotic duty of every Southern farmer to produce not only enough to supply himself but a surplus for sale, he will find it profitable to do so. It should be impossible to find a farm anywhere in the South without a home garden. The armies and navies of the United States and our allies will require large quantities of meats and the meat supply of the world is short. There is no part of the United States in which meat can be produced more profitably than in the South, and every Southern farmer should at once adopt the policy of producing more than enough meat to supply his own requirements. But, however high prices may go, he should not yield to the temptation to sell his breeding animals. It is safe to predict that live stock prices will be high for years to come and the farmer who parts with breeding animals now will be cutting off large future profits.

Every movement for the encouragement of the production of food crops and meats and for planting of home gardens on every farm and on vacant lots in the cities and towns should be encouraged. I know of no agency that can do more in this direction than the daily and weekly newspapers of the South. They can perform a patriotic duty of the highest value to the entire country, and especially the people of our own section, by impressing upon their readers day after day and week after week the supreme importance of overlooking no opportunity to increase the production of foods and feedstuffs in the South. I am confident that if every newspaper in the South will carry in each issue a pointed and vigorous editorial on this subject our problem of feeding ourselves and doing our share towards feeding our army and navy, and those of our allies will be solved.

**POSSIBILITIES OF OUR SOIL**

We want to say to the farmers of this community that no feature of present day education is more potent for good to this country than that now being accomplished by the various agricultural schools and experimental stations and farms.

Twenty years ago the "book farmer" was looked upon as a visionary by a large per cent of our farming population, and is even yet so regarded by some, though happily their number is small. Now the man who intelligently studies his soil with a view to determining its needs is coming to the front as an authority on matters agricultural. And the reason this is so is because his theories have brought forth fruit in fact.

Nothing is more certain than that this country is woefully behind in farming efficiency. For years our farming experts have been pointing out to us the fact that our lands are not producing a half, not even a third, of the crops that beautiful nature intended they should yield. One has only to cite the case of Germany in the state of Texas, yet Germany today is supplying her whole population and her vast armies almost entirely from the products of her own soil.

But Germany and other old world countries have for years practiced intensive farming, a system that is only just beginning to prevail in this country. Instead of being merely an experiment intensive farming should be the rule. Nothing more fully demonstrates the truth of this statement than a glance at the results obtained by the many corn clubs of the country. From all directions come reports from these organizations, where the enormous yield of 200 bushels and more per acre has been attained. Not only this, but the reports coming from all sections of the country are proof that almost any of our soil is susceptible to just such improvement.

Then there is another important feature to these big corn yields. It has been shown that they can be produced at a substantial profit over and above the cost of preparing the land for their production. Careful records have been kept of all expenditures and in almost every instance the proceeds have much more than paid the cost of bringing the soil to its present state of fertility.

If these results can be obtained from an acre, or two or three, why not from ten, or fifty, or a hundred acres? If they can be obtained from a patch, why not from a field? Why not from all fields?

The deplorable truth is that too many of our farmers are "necessity" farmers. They ask themselves, "How much do I need?" and then proceed to satisfy that need, and no more. They should rather ask, "How much can I get?" and then get all they can.

It has been estimated that America could feed the world if all her soil were made to produce to its full capacity. What that capacity is, we are only beginning to discover.

**EDUCATE MORE FARMERS.**

It is coming to be recognized as a most obvious fact that if we as a people are to again put our country on an equitable living basis we must educate more farmers. Not educate more farmer boys for professions, but educate more BOYS FOR FARMERS.

From the incipency of the public school up to within the last decade the entire trend of education has been away from the farm and toward the professions. Even the manual training schools have tended to swell the ranks of the mechanical trades at the expense of the farm.

No nation can achieve permanent prosperity without a great and prosperous farming class. When the farm decays the nation deteriorates. Our farms are the very life and heart of our country.

Some, though, may ask how we are to educate more farmers. Very simple. Make every free school in the land primarily an agricultural school, and a literary school as a secondary matter. Belles letters is not the crowning necessity of existence. Bread and meat are. Educate the youth of the land first toward that which is most vitally necessary to our national life, and when this is accomplished, if there be leisure and means for adding the frills let them be added.

Nine out of every ten high school pupils on emerging from that school enter the ranks of the toilers, in some department or other. If in their education the farm has not only been made attractive to them; but they have been given a thorough and practical knowledge of its workings, then a large per cent of them will as a matter of course choose that as their occupation in life.

But, you may ask, if all of the boys are educated to a farmer's life, what of the professions? There will always be some who, by natural fitness, will gravitate to the professions, enough to keep their ranks recruited. As a matter of fact, these same professions could spare half of their present members and not suffer in the least.

Educate farmers! The farms are suffering for them, and the professions and trades are overburdened with them.

Mr. Editor:  
As my time for your paper is about up I will send a little money to keep it coming as I sure love to hear from my old home town and country. While I like to live in Wauchula it takes lots of money to live on, the money is plentiful at the present time.

There has been 6 to 9 cars of vegetables shipped per day for some time. On the 14th of this month the truck growers called their truck to the Wauchula depot at about \$19,000.00. It is said that Deoto county never sold as much truck before in one season as will be sold this season. The truckers began shipping from here the last of March. They will get through about the 15th of May and about the 15th of August begin the fall crop. There are some things that will grow the year around, such as egg plant, collards, beans and several other things. The fact is we have vegetables 12 months in the year, grown at home. I planted about what the rest of the people did this spring and I planted the Black Valentine bean, squash, okra, egg plant, tomato, cukes, cabbage, onion, pepper, potatoes, beets and several other kinds of vegetables.

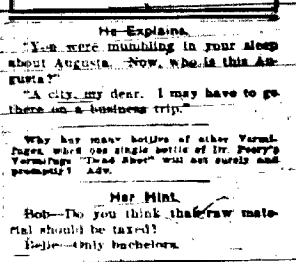

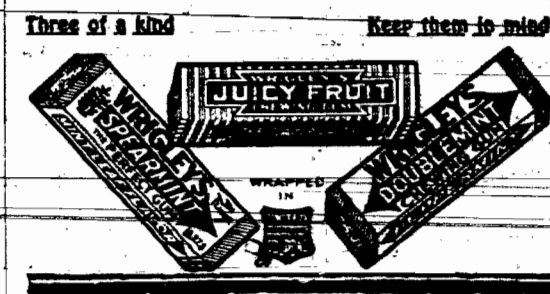
